Looking Back and Ahead...

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When I began the Masters Degree program at Michigan State University, my professional goal was to earn a degree that would help me to *better meet the needs* of all students in my classroom. In 2009 when I wrote this goal statement, I had been a classroom teacher for 14 years and had 3 children of my own who were in elementary and middle school. I have become more aware of the variety of different learning styles and behavioral differences in the children I teach. With this knowledge, I know that a *one size fits all approach to teaching* will not work in today's classrooms. I have found great success with the use of technology in all of the content areas that I teach.
